Plus, the many projects that pop up – there is so much happening that there is barely a moment in the day to stop and think and I never know what is around the corner or what the next day will bring!

What motivates you in your work?

I am motivated by the challenge of the unknown, by the puzzle that many of the projects present and by the many and varied queries that present themselves on a daily basis – the role of a librarian is one that never has a dull moment!

How has/can the M25 Consortium support you in your career?

I am very new to the role played by the M25 Consortium, I recently confessed that although I have been at the Museum for 4 years I was only ever aware of the Consortium as a group of academic libraries with whom we shared access arrangements. Now as British Museum Rep I am looking forward to exploring the many and varied opportunities that the Consortium can offer, the training, the networking, the possibility of linking with more institutions and sharing my own expertise whilst learning from others in the group.
